

Today's Introit takes from Psalm 26 verses 1,2, & 3. We first identify them scripturally then understand them in relation to today's feast.

Psalm 26 is sub-titled: "David's faith and hope in God." This Psalm expresses the great confidence the faithful soul should place in God.

For brevity's sake, Introits frequently excise Psalm verses, omitting a segment which simply repeats an idea already expressed. Below are today's Introit verses in full; parenthesis mark the liturgical omission.

1. The Lord is my light and my salvation: whom shall I fear? The Lord is the protector of my life: of whom shall I be afraid? 2. (Whilst the wicked draw near against me, to eat my flesh.) **Mine enemies that trouble me have themselves been weakened and have fallen.**

Regarding the first part, St. Robert Bellarmine comments: "Tribulation brings darkness, prosperity brings light and serenity; for tribulation confuses and confounds the soul, so that it cannot easily see how it ought to act, and thence is provoked to impatience, or some other sin. But should God, by his divine light, dispel the darkness, the soul at once sees that the tribulation, which in the darkness of the night brought such horrors with it, was temporary and trifling; and sees, at the same time, that tribulation, when God protects us, cannot do us any harm, but even tends marvelously to our good."

Regarding the second part, St. Robert continues: "He (David) describes the effects of God's protection, and, as usual with the prophets, makes use of the past for the future tense, to show the certainty of the matter. The meaning is, God will so protect me, that when they who wish me harm... will become 'so weak' and 'so fallen' by the efforts, that instead of harming me, they will only damage themselves." Such is the case is clear from the example, not only of David himself, but of Christ, and the martyrs, and all the saints.

3. If armies in camp should stand together against me, my heart shall not fear. (If a battle should rise up against me, in this will I be confident.)

The Saint remarks, "To show what unbounded confidence he has in God, he now says that he not only despises his enemies individually, but that he even fears not "armies in camp" of his enemies, and not only in camp but even in actual battle."

The Feast of the 4th Sunday after Pentecost, as reflected in the Introit, stirs us with a godly confidence to endure our conflicts. Lessons from the Epistle, "the sufferings of this time are not worthy to be compared with the glory to come," and the Gospel, "For he was wholly astonished, and all that were with him, at the draught of fishes they had taken" further brings this out.

Of note, Psalm 26 contains the common liturgical verse: "One thing I have asked of the Lord, this will I seek after; that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life." The confidence of the prophet rests upon this desire and this hope.

For the common good, should your child become unruly at Mass, please take him/her to the cry room/social hall. (Please note, the choir room is intended as an overflow room for the church, and should be considered as an extension thereof wherein silence is observed, rather than as another cry room). Also, do not bring food, drink or loud toys in the church; these may be had in the social hall. Meanwhile, let us all practice patience on this devilish matter, mindful of St. Paul's adage: "Bearing with one another, forgiving one another; if any has a complaint against another, even as the Lord has forgiven you, so do you also."

Sunday Dress & Modesty: Please dress appropriately at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. When sitting, a woman's dress should reach below her knees, cover her shoulders, and rest near the pit of the throat; a man ought to wear a suit & tie, or, at least, a collared shirt & clean slacks; shorts, short skirts, shirts with slogans, baggy or tight-fitting clothes are all inappropriate.

Signs of Worship: single genuflection, double genuflection & the head bow
No one, I know, likes a dead-fish handshake; it communicates no meaning, it might even be a lie. At Holy Mass, signs are as important as words are to communicate meaning. The Old Rite of Mass maintains fitting customs which reveal degrees of reverence for God. The genuflection, bowing the right knee which should rest momentarily on the ground, is done before the tabernacle to acknowledge the Creator of the Universe behind those golden doors. A double genuflection, kneeling with both knees touching the ground while slightly bowing at the waist, is done when the Lord of the Universe is exposed on the monstrance or in His passing by while in procession. A head-bow, bending the neck, is done at the Name of Jesus or when the Holy Trinity is invoked (if the Name appears often as in a Gospel reading, only the first three need be honored so, otherwise, one may look like they are going to sleep – a sign we do not want to give at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.
